COURSE DESCRIPTION

Germany is well-known for its discourses on nature if we look at philosophy or if we think of environmental politics. But is there also a significant tradition of Nature Writing in the literary field (like there is in English language literature)? For a long time, scholars would have denied this and would have argued about the reasons for this phenomenon. Not until recently there have been new academic and publishing endeavors to identify a – broken – tradition of Nature Writing in German language literature and also to acknowledge innovative contributions to the Genre in contemporary writing. In this course we will read and discuss different concepts and different examples of Nature Writing from the time of Romanticism until today.

COURSE OBJECTIVES AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

The objective of this course is to make students acquaintant with the questions and definitions of Nature Writing in general and with the literary traditions of writing about nature in German language specifically. At the end of the course students should have an overview of approaches and ways to write about nature and of the main changes in the relation between human and nature during the past 200 years. They will have deepend their knowledge concerning literary periods and genres, will have sharpened their skills in analyzing literature and discussing theoretical positions concerning the topic.

YOUR INSTRUCTOR

Dr. Marita Meyer studied Germanic Philology, Philosophy and History of Art in Heidelberg, where she obtained her doctor's degree in 2000 with a book on Peter Weiss and questions of representing the Holocaust. She worked as a lecturer at Yale University in 2000/01 and as a lecturer for the German Academic Exchange Service (DAAD) at the University of Szczecin (Poland) from 2001 to 2006. Since 2007, she has been teaching German literature and culture at Freie Universität Berlin, where she was head of the Master's program "Deutsch als Fremdsprache: Kulturvermittlung" from 2013 to 2015. Since 2018 she teaches as Guest Professor at Middlebury College, Vermont, and since Fall 2022 also in the International Program of Humboldt University. Her recent research and publications focus on the discourses of globalisation and ecology in art and literature.
